The man returned Max to Pace. About that time, Pace said, he heard that Summer wanted to start a police dog program.

The Tanaka Foundation in Seattle helped out by buying Max from Pace for \$3,500. The foundation also donated \$30,000 for Max's kennels, leashes and harnesses; modifications to a police car handler's uniforms; and other start-up expenses.

Pace trained Max and Kib-

linger. They also trained with the master dog trainer for the Pierce County Sheriff's Department.

A police dog is an exceptional animal who serves the community day in and day out, said Bruce Jackson, a retired Tacoma officer who helped start the police dog program in Tacoma. The dog in creases officer safety because it can penetrate brushy, wooded areas in the dark to find hidden criminal suspects, he said.

Jackson handled Ryker, Tacoma's first police dog, who was killed while pursuing an armed robbery suspect in 1982. Jackson also helped Summer start his pro-

gram. Although he's a rookie, Max has demonstrated intelligence and responsiveness on duty.

Kiblinger said he and the dog went to Puyallup last summer to assist in tracking a suspect who ran from police and who had felony arrest warrants against him.

After the suspect entered one yard, a homeowner came outside brandishing a rake and drove the suspect off.

About that time, Max came over the fence. The homeowner had his rake still raised as if to strike and the neighbor's small dog lunged at Max. Even veter-

police dogs might have trouble maintaining focus in that situation, Jackson and Pace said, but Max obeyed Kiblinger's command and didn't go after the neighbor or his dog.

"He's great at home," Kiblinger said. "He's a 2-year-old daughter who climbs all over him and he doesn't care. He's doing well."

Mayor's fate up to voters

SPOKANE—Signatures collected by organizers of a recall of Mayor Jim West in a City Hall scandal were certified Friday, sending the issue to the voters in a special election in December.

County elections workers stopped checking names and addresses on petitions Thursday after counting 12,684 signed Friday, 117 more than needed for the recall petitions, said Elections Supervisor Paul Brandt.

The City of Spokane will pay the estimated \$140,000 to \$160,000 cost of the special election Dec. 6, Dalton said.

Press the results were not unexpected, and he plans to prepare a campaign to fight the recall.
